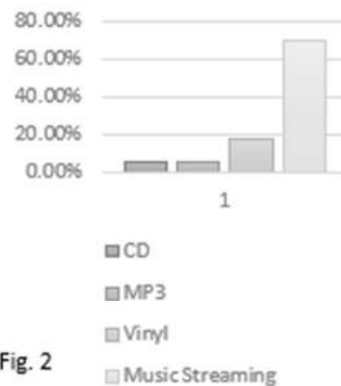

The older someone's favorite band / artist is, the more likely they are to prefer Vinyl's or CDs vs. Music Streaming

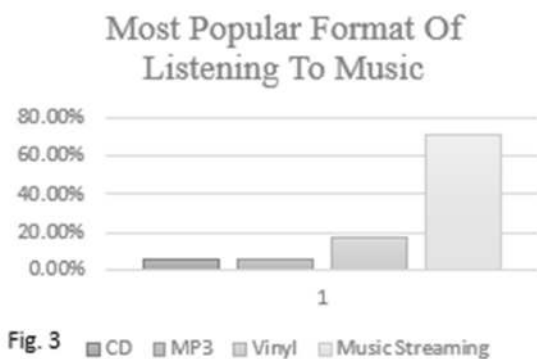
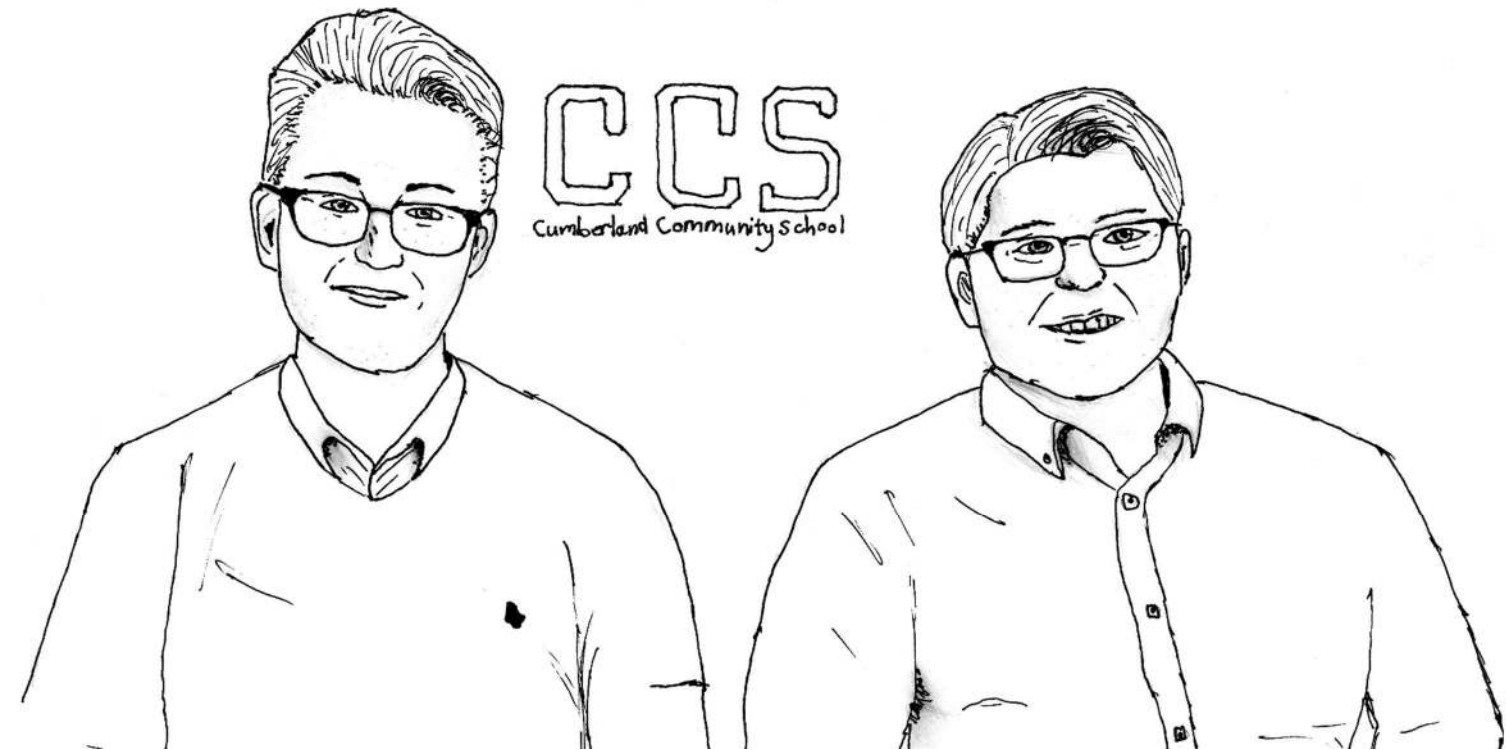

What Decade does Cumberland think Music Peaked in?

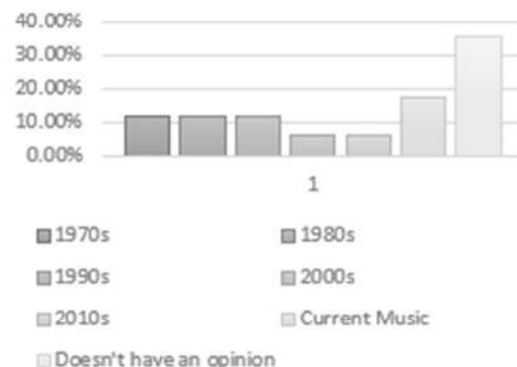

WHAT GENRE OF MUSIC DO PEOPLE AT CUMBERLAND LIKE?

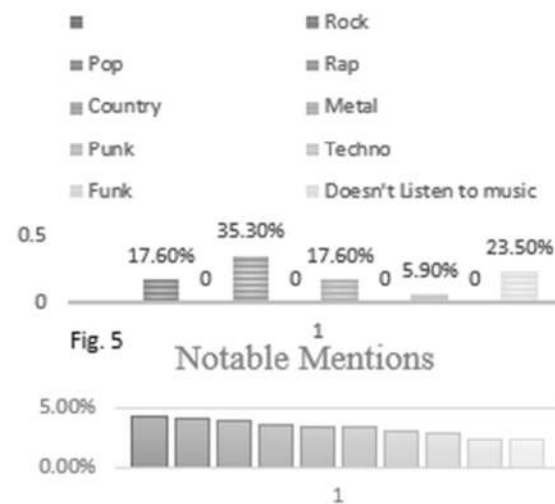

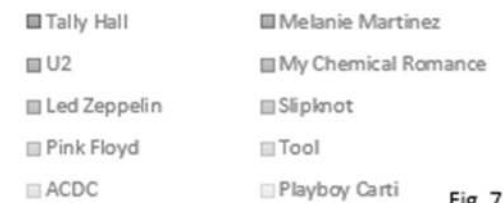

The Most Popular Bands/Performers At Cumberland

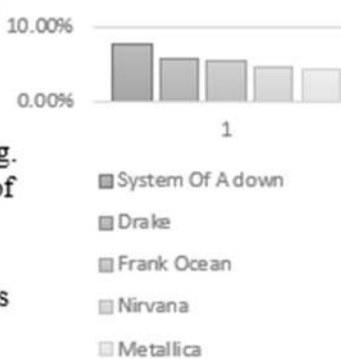

A4: Later this month.

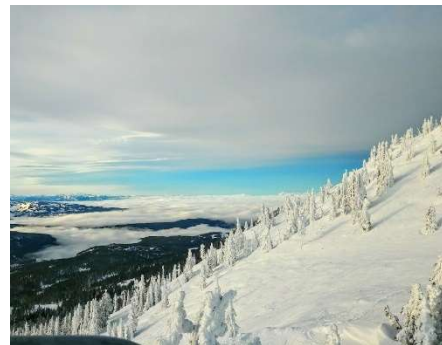
Q5: What is your favorite subject?
