Finding Scholarships and Bursaries

Thinking about finding scholarships and bursaries can be overwhelming, and most students struggle with knowing where to begin.

This newsletter was created to help you find scholarships and bursaries that you may qualify for to offset the costs of attending a post-secondary institution.

There are many scholarships and bursaries out there if you look for them and put in the time to apply. It does take work to put together an application, but it can be worth the effort.

It is important to remember that if you don't apply, you won't receive anything.

Every year many scholarships and bursaries go unawarded because students did not apply for the them.



Important Terminology

Some of the terminology associated with scholar-ships, bursaries, and financial aid can be confusing. Listed below are some of the most common terms that you will hear:

Bursaries—financial awards that are based on both financial need and criteria set by the donor, founder or individual institution. Scholarships –are awarded based on various criteria, which usually reflect the values and purposes of the founder of the award.

Entrance scholarships—money (typically based on marks) awarded to students by postsecondary institutions at the time of acceptance. Check when you apply.

Student Loans—money loaned from the government to students. Must be repaid.

Grants– money that does not have to be repaid.

PROVINCIAL & NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Many scholarships and bursaries are from union or employer groups, professional organizations, special interest groups, etc. Although there is no "master list" of scholarships or bursaries out there, there are many scholarship databases that students can use to help them find scholarship and bursary opportunities. ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS

Every post secondary institution has its own scholarships and bursary program. When you apply to an institution check their website (usually under financial aid). Some of the scholarships and awards require a separate application. Most Entrance Scholarships have different deadlines than the deadline for admission. Talk to the institution's advisor directly if you have questions.

VANIER BURSARY/SCHOLARSHIPS

The GP Vanier Bursary/Scholarship program opens to grade 12 students on <u>January 19, 2023</u>. There will be an assembly outlining the application process and counsellors offer sessions to support students on successful applications. Information can be found on the GP Vanier Website under the "Grad" Tab. All GP Vanier students are strongly encouraged to apply. Student have until <u>February 24th at 1pm</u> to hand in their completed applications.

DISTRICT/AUTHORITY AWARDS

These awards worth \$1,250 recognize excellence in non-academic fields, including Fine Arts, Applied Skills, Physical Activity, Second Languages, Community Service, and Technical and Trades Training. 

Student Loans

There is no doubt that funding your post -secondary education will be expensive. It is extremely worthwhile to spend the time searching for and applying for scholarships and bursaries.

However, you may find that you cannot afford to pay for the full cost of postsecondary. Student loans exist to help students overcome financial barriers to higher education.

STUDENT LOANS are repayable financial assistance. Government-provided student loans are based on financial need and are interest-free while you are enrolled in full-time study (no interest rate is charged for BC governmentissued student loans). One application to StudentAid BC covers application to both the BC and Canada student loan programs.

OTHER STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSIS-

TANCE programs include specific supports for low- and middle-income students, former youth in care, students who have a permanent disability, or a persistent or prolonged disability, and borrowers who need help with repayment. For more infomation, visit StudentAid BC.

Counsellor Tips

- 1. Begin drafting a letter of introduction which include:
 - a) Introduce yourself
 - b) Explain your post-secondary plans
 - c) Summarize your interests, activities, involvements, accomplishments, etc.
 - d) Comment on your financial circumstances if appropriate
 - e) Closing comment thanking committee for considering your application
- 2. Think about which teachers, mentors or coaches could write you a glowing refence letter. Ask two people to do this and give them lots of time.
- 3. Check the GP Vanier announcements weekly for scholarship and bursary information.
- 4. Save everything! Print or save a copy of all applications, reference letters, essay questions etc. You will find that a lot of scholarships applications require the same information and ask similar essay guestions. Save yourself time and energy by having this information at your fingertips.
- 5. Pay attention to deadlines. Ensure that your application is not sent in at the last minute.
- 6. Never assume you are not good enough for an award. If you meet the criteria, Apply! Apply! Apply!
- 7. Proof read your applications and ask someone else to proofread it too. Make sure that your application looks professional



The Most Commonly Asked Question

Q: If I don't go to post-secondary next year should I still apply for scholarships and bursaries?

A: If in doubt, apply! Many organizations will allow you to defer collecting your award for a year unless they specifically state otherwise.

Accessing/Sending Your Transcript

Follow these steps to view, order, and send your secondary school transcripts. Your transcript can be sent electronically or by mail to post secondary institutions and employers. To register you will need your **Personal Education Number (PEN)** found on your report card.

Step 1: Go to www.StudentTranscripts.gov.bc.ca

Step 2: You MUST sign up for a Basic BCeID account before you can use the Transcript Service

Step 3: Log-in to Student Transcripts Service using your BCeID

Step 4: From your Dashboard, you can send and order transcripts, view assessment results and send transcripts immediately.

There are **detailed instructions** on how to order your transcript on the **Vanier website** under the Grad tab. Grade 12 students can send up to 25 transcripts to post-secondary institutions for **free**.
