







This eagle is eating salmon.




Baby eagles get some salmon too. Baby eagles are called eaglets.

A big branch is being added to this nest.




This eagle is flying away from its nest.

Alan Cornall was born in Plymouth, England in 1937. He began his photographic career as a hobbyist but soon enrolled in the British School of further Education where he was awarded Best Student Honours in 1964. In 1967 Alan emigrated to Montreal and in 1971 moved to British Columbia.

Alan developed a strong interest in competition and has gone on to win countless awards in both the United States and Canada. Some of his more prestigious awards include National Award for Best Colour in show in 1980, Photographer of the year in 1983, The Craftsman Award in 1988, the Kodak Award for Excellence in 1992 and 1998. He received the International Gold Medal from the Society of America in 1981, Royal Court of Honour in 1992 in the USA and has prints in the permanent collection of the public archives of Canada. He also received the People's Choice Award at the Brant Wildlife Festival in 2001 and 2002, Best Wildlife in the Provincial in 2003, Best Commercial in 2004 and the Master's Bar in 2005.

Alan's work encompasses everything from portraits to commercial photography, but his true love lies with nature and more recently with wildlife. With his wife, Margret, as his companion he has driven thousands of miles searching for perfect images. He makes his home in Parksville, B.C., but don't count on him always being there. Alan's immense fascination for nature and wildlife lead him to adventure and travel at every opportunity.



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
