PAC Principal's Report for Thursday, November 10th, 2022 Happenings Since our last meeting around Royston Elementary:

- "Secret Path Week" was October 17th-20th, and it culminated with our school participating in its fourth annual Chanie Wenjack Walk for Reconciliation on Thursday, October 20th. Doug David and Mat Zadvorny really stepped up to make this a special experience for our students.
- Thanks to the efforts of many parents, but particularly Briana (Noot) and Tara (Pietrzak), we hosted a very lively Halloween "Spooktacular" on October 27".
- October 27th also saw the Fire Safety House visit Royston El. Thanks to the firefighters
 of the Courtenay firehall for providing this experience for our grade 3 students. In March
 2023, the Courtenay fire hall plans to reach back out to us to provide the experience for
 our grade 4/5 students who may have missed it over the past couple of years due to the
 pandemic.
- In October we updated our website to now include a "Parent Emergency Protocols" information item under the "Parent Info" tab. We have asked parents to familiarize themselves with these protocols so that we are all on the same page in the event of an emergency situation.
- This week wraps up the final week of the FSA (Foundation Skills Assessment). We thank our grade 4 teachers for the time that they took out of their schedules to help facilitate getting these assessments completed.
- Volleyball season has started at Royston El, and we are very fortunate to have two (2) grade 5/6 co-ed teams. Thanks to Ms. Von Niessen and Mr. Fleischer for coaching these teams.

 Today we conducted our first live Remembrance Day ceremony since Nov 2019. Our students conducted themselves very well, and we had 4 separate classes contribute to the ceremony (which is amazing). Big thanks to those teachers who participated, and to Ms. Cameron, who organized the assembly.

Looking forward to the weeks/month ahead at Royston Elementary:

- Planning is underway for our Winter Concert. The biggest issue facing us presently is how to limit the audience to less than 500 for the evening performance. We will likely be using an rsvp/ticket system.
- On November 22nd the WWEST STEM team is coming to Royston El to work with seven (7) of our classes. WWEST (Westcoast Women in Engineering and Technology) is affiliated through SFU, and they will be bringing in fun STEM activities to share with our students.
- Grade 6 immunizations are set to take place on Friday, December 2[™].
- November 25th is our second spirit day: moustache day. We will also be hosting our November Celebration of Success assembly that day.
- "Release the Rhythm" is a day long workshop that is coming to Royston on December 7th as part of the Artstarts program. "Release the Rhythm" is a full day of drumming, tapping, clapping & chanting for the whole school with expert percussionist and professional musician Daniel Duggan. We will start the day with the fully interactive "Release the Rhythm" show for the whole school audience, followed by multiple Handson Afro-Peruvian drumming workshops. Where students will learn to play percussion instruments from around the world through energetic, creative and fun hands-on workshops.

Student Affordability Fund:

Earlier this year, the Ministry of Education and Child Care announced the introduction of the Student and Family Affordability Fund. The \$60 million provincial fund is intended to support students and families who are struggling with rising costs due to global inflation. Our district has been allocated \$980,365. The funding is provided on a one-time basis and must be spent by June 30, 2023. In the last week of October SD71 has decided to transfer a significant portion of these funds directly to schools, and Royston is slated to receive approximately \$16500. A spending plan is due to the district by Dec 1st, 2022.

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
