A. WELCOME

The Chair welcomed the Committee members and called the meeting to order at 6:30pm.

B. ITEMS DISCUSSED

1. West Side Math Learning

Lance Lloyd talked about the Westside Learning Community related to mathematics. He emphasized the collaborative aspect of the projects which involved all of the feeder schools to Lake Trail. He was very thankful and appreciative for the Collaborative Inquiry funds the district provided to make this possible.

2. Mission to Mars

Tim Horner spoke about the project-based learning initiative at Lake Trail called "Mission to Mars". The project allowed students in grade 8 and 9 to collaboratively work together on a cross-curricular project that included reading, writing, science and math. It was a

great experience for the students and culminated in a showcase afternoon in the gymnasium.

3. Fluid Ability Groupings, Multi-grade Team Teaching, Formative Assessment and Research-based strategies for success in intermediate math

Huband teachers Teresa Cameron, Bobby Carter and Kjeryn Haughton spoke about their mathematics groupings at Huband Elementary School. Students move fluidly between grade groupings and work on math in small groups interchangeably with different teachers. They feel this has greatly increased their students' interest and enthusiasm in math as well as their understanding.

4. Heartwood Learning Community

Jeff Taylor spoke about the Heartwood Learning Community at Navigate. The program has traditionally been a K-9 program and he spoke of the desire to increase this program to include grade 10 next year. The program consists of learning communities across Vancouver Island and the province. This program fills a learning niche for students who want to learn in their own region, but not in a traditional brick and mortar school.

5. Secondary School Wrap Up

Geoff Manning gave a secondary summary to trustees. The summary included what each secondary school has done around the area of Educational Excellence this school year.

It is with humble pleasure that I delivered the welcoming acknowledgement to an audience here tonight to listen to Senator Murray Sinclair, a remarkable individual who served as Chief Commissioner of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

In our community, indeed, in our school district here in the Comox Valley, reconciliation and the 94 recommendations are impacting lives of students everyday. Our Board of Education build a robust strategic priorities plan to include the goal of deepening our integration of Indigenous ways and knowing.

We recognize and embrace the responsibility as educators, and as Canadians to build respectful relationships and we begin by bringing the rich Indigenous traditions and culture of this region into the classroom in as many creative and imaginative ways as possible. Through art, storytelling, drumming, and dance to learning the language of the Kwak'wala, and enriching our partnership with the K'omoks First Nations, our students from as young as kindergarten through to grade 12 are receiving and enriching learning experience.

We commissioned our own school District song, Am'lala sa Kumuxse' that speaks of our great land and culture. We became the first District in the nation to fully sign on each and every school to the Downie-Wenack Legacy School Program. Fortunate we are to have an Indigenous Education team of Indigenous Support Workers and an enriching Elders-in-Residence program to help us along the journey of reconciliation.

There are so many more, great examples such as Lake TRail Middle School participating in Dark Spark, a song writing project about Truth and Reconciliation, and Highland participating in a chapbook with Wendy Morton, award winning poet, storytelling journey about reconciliation.

IEC Report to PC

The Indigenous Education Committee recently met on February 20 and 21 to discuss a range of topics. The IEC welcomed and included the chair of the Professional Learning Committee to join and contribute to the discussions.

The committee discussed the importance of the British Columbia Tripartite Education Agreement (BCTEA) and how this agreement will impact school districts throughout the province. The IEC will be developing strategies to provide a report that will include recommendations to boards of education regarding the BCTEA.

FNESC

The IEC invited the First Nations Education Steering Committee (FNESC) to attend and provide a presentation to the committee in the spirit of on-going cooperation and mutual goals.

Two staff representatives from FNESC provided a detailed presentation regarding information on BCTEA and Indigenous student graduation rates.

Both FNESC and BCSTA agree that a continued partnership to share data and important information will greatly benefit all students of British Columbia.

Joint Committee Meeting

The IEC and the PLC held a joint committee meeting on Friday, February 21. The two committees discussed several topics including the importance of involving FNESC on future BCSTA events and meetings. It was noted that future events will have a targeted focus on Indigenous student success.

The last phase of the session focused upon system level measures and communications strategies, ending on a very positive note with an appreciation circle. The work this Board has already done on our Strategic Plan, the regular reviews through our Education Committee as well as its use for Budgeting and focusing district efforts at all levels on student success and achievement was recognized and acknowledged.

<u>Purpose</u>

As a Board, we recognize and support the value of parent engagement and participation. Along with our indigenous partners, we have proof that consistent engagement and building long term relationships brings great value to our program planning and delivery of services. However, the one group that is missing in this process are our students. Having their voice at the table is important. Our students today are more engaged, they are providing leadership in areas of environmental stewardship and mental health awareness and advocacy. They are not afraid to ask hard questions and provide solutions to problems they see needing change, such as the recent letter we received from a student around our outdated district dress code policy. As a Board, we would benefit from having a district student advisory council that would meet on a regular or semi-regular basis where they could discuss the issues and concerns that they have, along with providing the Board their thoughts on a number of our strategic goals such as mental health & wellbeing and environmental stewardship.

What do we really know about the issues that our students face today? Having students share their experiences and speak to issues that are of concern to them by way of supporting and providing a district student advisory council, builds on student leadership and provides a forum for continued dialogue and collaboration.

We need to be talking to our students, hearing from them, understanding their views and perspectives on not only on educational initiatives, but also how best to prepare them for the next step as they embark on their next journey, entering into an ever changing global world and economy. Dear Trustees,

Thank you for the numerous thoughtful comments made at the board meeting last night and for your desire to approve changes that have the least impact on our students, their families and their teachers. I would, however, be remiss in my role as CDTA president if I didn't take the time to outline some serious concerns I have with respect to the amended recommendation around Cumberland Community School.

This year, the Collective Agreement between SD71 and the CDTA required senior management to add another division to Cumberland in the first week of school because one class had too many designated students in it.

SD71 has a duty to try and "make best efforts" to stay within class size and composition limits and you have until September 30, 2020 to come into compliance. I anticipate last night's decision to not move the grade 9s from Cumberland to Vanier will result in failure to come into compliance with our collective agreement and thereby not show best efforts. This amendment is very likely to create overages in class size and composition in advance of the school year. Violations of the collective agreement will be grieved when this happens.

Adjusted operational capacity is a ministry number based on square footage and without consideration of collective agreement language. In our case, this will become problematic. The collective agreement is specific about numbers of students at each grade level and is reduced when there are designated students.

I understand your options will be to lose the community programs' space. How that will affect the community school designation will also need to be considered. Other options included the addition of a modular, which couldn't be confirmed as being ready for September. Even if these two options come to pass, you are still likely to contravene your teachers' collective agreement.

I am willing to come and meet with you to explain how your teachers' collective agreement impacts the creation of classes, places space limitations on senior management, and ultimately strives to reduce class size, thus improving the learning conditions for students and the working conditions of teachers.

I look forward to hearing from you through the board chair.

Dear Tom and Ian,

As you know, the provincial parties signed the Memorandum of Agreement Re: LOU #17 on March 9, 2017. The agreement sets out that commencing in September of the 2017–18 school year and thereafter school staffing will, subject to the terms of the agreement, comply with the restored collective agreement provisions. The school district is obligated, under the terms of the agreement, to implement all language pertaining to non-enrolling ratios, process and ancillary language, caseload, and class size and composition. The school district must also make "best efforts" to achieve full compliance with the collective agreement provisions regarding class size and composition for the commencement of the 2017–18 school year and in subsequent years.

On February 25th of this year, senior management recommended moving the grade nines from Cumberland Community School to G. P. Vanier in order to address the class size and composition issues expected in the 2020-2021 school year. The board of trustees did not support this recommendation and therefore, the school district will move ahead with a plan that is problematic and could trigger noncompliance with class size and composition language. This decision may see the district fail to make best efforts in the fall.

I am respectfully requesting further information regarding your plans to come into compliance as soon as possible. I look forward to meeting with you both to proactively monitor the situation at Cumberland Community School.
