

STRATEGIC DIRECTION

Boundary Consultation Recommendations

Trustees voted on five recommendations to address overcapacity in some District schools due to increasing enrollment. The following were approved:

Royston Elementary

- Pursue the addition of one modular for 2020 and an additional modular for 2021 to address anticipated growth
- Close all cross-boundary transfers
- Grade 6 will remain
- Begin the process to request a capital expansion.

Cumberland Community School

- Grade 9 will remain
- The Annex will be designated as space for the community school
- Close all cross-boundary transfers
- Pursue an additional modular to address growth
- Begin the process to request a capital expansion.

Miracle Beach

- Remain a feeder school to G.P. Vanier Secondary
- Close all cross-boundary transfers.

Huband Park Elementary

- Current grade 6 and 7 students will be grandfathered to allow students to complete their elementary years at the school
- Effective Sept 2021, all cross boundary transfers will be rescinded and those affected students will return to their catchment school to finish elementary years
- Facilitate families of cross boundary transfers wishing to return to catchment school in 2020
- Close all cross-boundary transfers
- Remain a feeder school to G.P. Vanier Secondary
- Catchment boundary will remain unaffected.

Superintendent Report

Summer School coming July 2020

- One secondary campus (Isfeld) and two elementary campuses (Valley View and Courtenay El.).
- Free to District students.

Cross Boundary Restrictions

In addition to the recommendations for the four elementary schools, to ease capacity pressures at the secondary level, **G.P. Vanier Secondary** and **Mark R. Isfeld Secondary** are closed to all cross-boundary transfers.

For 2020/21, the following schools are closed to cross-boundary transfer including siblings.

- Cumberland Community SchoolRoyston Elementary
- Huband Park Elementary
- Miracle Beach Elementary
- G.P. Vanier SecondaryMark R. Isfeld Secondary

All *other* transfer requests can be made online during the month of March only.

Youth Climate Action Conference - A First for the Region

Comox Valley Schools hosted the first Regional Youth Climate Action Conference at Florence Filberg Centre on February 13. The conference, titled **#EmpowermentforImpact,** was the first of its kind targeted for students in grade 8 to 12 throughout Vancouver Island and surrounding regions.

More than 300 registrants attended from the Valley and neighbouring school districts including Nanaimo/Ladysmith, Parksville/Qualicum, Powell River, and Campbell River.

The District's secondary school environment club educators Heather Beckett and Jill Peacock along with Serina Allison, EOL teacher, developed a robust day-long agenda centered entirely on optimism and positive environmental action. They brought in an impressive list of guest speakers with designed several activities and action workshops geared toward empowering and fostering collaboration.

Serina Allison, District Environmental and Outdoor Learning (EOL) teacher, teamed up Jill Peacock, recently retired educator and Heather Beckett, Mark R. Isfeld, to develop a robust agenda that included presentations from key community leaders, team-building activities, expert panel discussions, brainstorming, and, for the grand finale, an intense collaboration exercise on drafting a feasible action plan to tackle local issues.

Jenn Meilleur, F2C Coordinator, held the first of three learning circles February 19. The event brought key school and community stakeholders together to create a vision, goals, action and an implementation plan for an already robust school feeding program. SKILLS CANADA BC REGIONALS District captures Gold in 13 of 20 events!

Skills Canada BC's North Island Regional event was held at G.P. Vanier Secondary School on Friday, February 21.

A total of 240 competitors from 17 schools across the region competed in skilled trades and technology categories ranging from automotive, carpentry, culinary, and welding to media including photography, animation, and web design. A junior event is also included in the annual regional event with competitions in gravity cars (design and performance), spaghetti-bridge design and VexIQ robotics.

Competitors winning at the regional competition advance to the provincials 15 April at the Abbotsford Tradex. Provincial winners will advance to the Skills Canada Nationals that will be held at the Vancouver Convention Centre 28 and 29 May. Students can then compete at the WorldSkills competition.

"I am always amazed to see the skill level of students at this competition and see these kids as our future designers, coders, builders and troubleshooters," says Steve Claassen, Career Coordinator for Trades and ADST who organized the event and has been involved with Skills Canada for almost 20 years. "Our valley is fortunate to have some very skilled students in Trades and Technology and in most years some of our student reach the nationals and comes back with medals."
