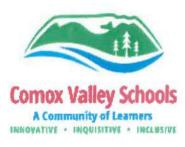

RE:	Capital Project Update – October 2018

Purpose

To update the Board of Education on the three major capital projects currently underway.

Background

School District 71 presently has Capital Project Certificates of Approval from the Ministry of Education for three major capital projects. They are the Vanier Seismic Project Upgrade (\$33 million), the Lake Trail Seismic Project Upgrade (\$27 million), and the Hornby Island School Modular project and partial demolition of the fire damaged school (\$2 million).

These projects require a significant amount of time to plan, mange and execute.

Analysis

Vanier Seismic – this project achieved Substantial Completion status on September 4th 2018. Construction work continues on the roof, sheet flooring and building cladding, flashing and paint. These components will be completed no later than October 31st. Minor deficiencies and clean up work will be done by October 18th. This project completed on time and budget.

Lake Trail Seismic – the work of the Education Design committee is complete and detailed design work by the architect and consulting engineers is making good progress. Working construction drawings will be ready for tender no later than March 1st 2019.

Hornby Island School Fire - the arson at the school has resulted in four major projects at the school site:

- Temporary classrooms the Room to Grow building and the Community Hall were quickly and significantly upgraded to allow for educational programming. The School District has a lease for both spaces until December 31st 2018.
- Building assessment , salvage and partial demolition the preparatory work is complete and the contract awarded for the partial demolition (\$300K). The demolition work begins October 15th and will be complete by October 31st.

- Modular classrooms, library and admin building project the project to design, locate, conduct site preparations and procure five modular buildings (\$1.5 million) is well underway. SD 71 and Westcoast Outbuildings have entered into contract for the production and transportation of the buildings to the Hornby Island School site. This will provide an excellent learning space for students.
- 4. School replacement a consulting team is engaged to work with the Director of Operations to prepare a report for the Ministry of Education with options for the replacement school.

Background

Attached is a copy of the Statement of Financial Information (SOFI) for School District No. 71 (Comox Valley) for the year ended June 30, 2018. In accordance with the Financial Information Act, each School Board is required to prepare a report of financial information for each fiscal year. Included in the report are the two following schedules:

Schedule of Remuneration and Expenses

This schedule lists all payments made to trustees and those employees with remuneration exceeding \$75,000.

Remuneration includes any form of salary, wages, taxable benefits, payment into trust or any form of income deferral paid by the Board to an employee, but does not include anything payable under a severance agreement. Remuneration for individual employees can include payouts for vacation and compensatory time not taken, in addition to regular salary. Taxable benefits include auto allowances for employees who regularly use their personal vehicle for school district business and the employer-paid portion of provincial medical insurance and group life insurance premiums. Expenses are defined to include travel expenses, memberships, tuition, relocation expenses, registration fees and similar amounts paid directly to an employee, or to a third party on behalf of an employee.

Schedule of Suppliers of Goods and Services

This schedule lists total payments made to suppliers in excess of \$25,000.

Payments made for the provision of goods and services include all payments made from operating, special purpose and capital funds for the supply of goods and services. A significant portion of the supplier payments represents contributions to pension and employee benefit plans and contractors for capital projects. Payments for both employer and employee contributions to employee benefit plans are included.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Statement of Financial Information for School District No. 71 (Comox Valley) for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018 be received by the Finance Committee, and forwarded to the Board of Education for information.

EXPLANATION OF DIFFERENCE

The schedule of payments for the provision of goods and services differs from the financial statements in the following ways:

- 100% of GST paid to suppliers is included, whereas the financial statement expenditures are net of the GST rebate

- Third party recoveries of expenses from PAC and school fundraising activities may not all be adjusted for in the schedules

- Employee benefits may be duplicated in the schedule of payments where also reported in employee remuneration

- Travel expenses that are paid directly to suppliers may be duplicated in employee expenses

- Other miscellaneous cost recoveries that may not have been deducted from scheduled payments

- Holdbacks relating to Capital Projects may be accrued, however, not included in the schedule of payments for goods and services

The financial statements are reported on an accrual basis, and include payroll liabilities that are not reflected in the schedule of remuneration and expenses, and accounts payable balances that are not reflected in the schedule of payment for goods and services. Changes in liability balances from year to year affect the financial statement expenditures but not the scheduled payments which are reported on a cash basis.

Background/Rationale

At the request of the Finance Committee, a review and analysis of current trustee remuneration has been completed and summarized below. The analysis includes a comparison of current remuneration to similar sized districts in British Columbia, and the impact of the changes in tax treatment for 1/3 of trustee remuneration from non-taxable to taxable. The current remuneration structure for trustees in School District No. 71 is:

Vice-Chairperson	15,048
Chairperson	16,554

Analysis

A survey of trustee compensation was completed by the BC School Trustees Association in December 2017. In order to perform a reasonable analysis of current remuneration for trustees in School District No. 71, 17 similar sized districts (enrolment between 4,000 and 10,000 students) were used as comparators, with 2 outlier districts being removed (West Vancouver and New Westminster) as the trustees in these 2 districts are paid in excess of \$20,000.

The average trustee remuneration of these similar sized districts is \$12,731. Based on this analysis, the current remuneration in SD71 is reasonable.

A comparison to other publicly elected officials was not included, due to the diverse differences in remuneration between the different municipalities and the differences in the roles and responsibilities.

Further consideration should be given to the upcoming CRA changes to the non-accountable allowances paid to school trustees. Currently 1/3 of trustee remuneration is non-taxable. Effective January 1, 2019, the entire amount of remuneration will be taxable. In SD71, the impact of including the non-accountable allowances as taxable income is estimated to be an average reduction of net trustee remuneration by 2.5%, or approximately \$340.

The changes to taxation of remuneration will also impact the additional stipend that the Vice-Chairperson and Chairperson receive. The impact on these amounts has been determined to be less than 1% with a reduction of approximately \$200 for the Vice-Chairperson and \$400 for the Chairperson.

It is recommended that the Finance Committee recommend adjusting trustees' remuneration effective January 1, 2019 by 2.5% to recognize the impact of the tax treatment change, as well as the additional stipend that the Vice-Chairperson and Chairperson receive. This would result in the following trustee remuneration structure effective January 1, 2019:

Trustees	\$13,900
Vice-Chairperson	15,600
Chairperson	17,300

A regular review process should also be considered, so that trustee remuneration is reviewed on an annual basis and reasonable increases are granted. The majority of districts in BC use the BC Consumer Price Index as a measure for granting cost of living increases to trustees.

The attached draft Policy/Regulation re: Trustee Remuneration is recommended for review by the Policy Committee and recommendation to the Board.

Recommendation

It is recommended:

- THAT the Board of Education approve the base remuneration for trustees, effective January 1, 2019 to be \$13,900; the additional remuneration for the Board Chair to be \$3,400; and the additional remuneration for the Vice-Chair to be \$1,700.
- THAT the Board of Education approve the annual adjustment of trustee remuneration, effective July 1st of each year, based on the BC Consumer Price Index change from December 31st of the prior year.
- THAT the draft Trustee Remuneration Policy and Regulation be forwarded to the Policy Committee for review and recommendation to the Board.

Policy - Trustee Remuneration and Expenses

The Board of Education of School District No. 71 (Comox Valley) believes that Trustees should be compensated for their work related to the business of the Board.

In accordance with the provisions of the School Act, a Board may authorize, through a Board resolution, the payment of remuneration and reasonable allowance for expenses incurred by trustees in the discharge of their duties.

1. Trustee Remuneration

Amount

Trustees' annual remuneration shall be as follows, effective January 1, 2019:

Chairperson of the Board	\$xxx

Payment

Trustee remuneration will be paid on a semi-monthly basis.

Review

Trustee remuneration will be reviewed annually and an adjustment shall be made to the base remuneration amount only, effective July1stst of each year. The adjustment will reflect the BC Consumer Price Index change (change from previous year as at December 31st).

2. Trustee Expenses

Trustees shall be entitled to reimbursement of out of district travel expenses in accordance with district policy.

3. Trustee Equipment

The Board will provide the necessary equipment to enable trustees to effectively perform their duties and responsibilities.

Section 7 - Instruction

School District No. 71 (Comox Valley)

Administrative Procedure 7025 Alternate Delivery of Curriculum

Preamble

The purpose of this policy is to explain how students and their parents/guardians may, in consultation with their school, arrange for alternative delivery of instruction with regard to specific prescribed learning outcomes pertaining to reproduction and human sexuality within the Physical Health Education (PHE) and Career Life Education (CLE) curriculum. This procedure does not apply to any other BC Curriculum.

Policy Statement

The PHE and CLE curriculum include prescribed learning outcomes that some students and their parents/guardians may feel more comfortable addressing by means other than instruction by a teacher in a regular classroom setting.

In such instances, students with their parents'/guardians' consent and in consultation with their school may arrange to address the prescribed learning outcomes by agreed upon alternative means.

It is expected that students will, in consultation with their school, demonstrate their knowledge of the specific prescribed learning outcome(s) they have arranged to address by alternative means.

There are several ways in which schools can accommodate student and/or parent/guardian preference to address prescribed learning outcomes in the PHE and CLE curriculum by alternative means. Some examples include:

- home instruction using a school-determined package of materials or other agreed upon materials;
- distributed Learning (formerly distance education/distance electronic learning);
- Self directed studies, using the learning standards for this curriculum on the BC Ministry of Education website.

 The policy applies only to the prescribed learning outcomes in the PHE and CLE curriculum relating to human sexuality, body parts, healthy relationships and mental well being. The policy does not apply to any other prescribed learning outcomes in these Integrated Resource Packages (IRP) nor does it apply to any other provincial curriculum/IRP.
