# Province announces new school for Hornby Island; \$27 million in upgrades to Lake Trail

"All students deserve to learn in safe and inspiring schools that give them the best chance to succeed," said Rob Fleming, Minister of Education, at a press conference held at Lake Trail. "With new, modern facilities coming to Courtenay and Hornby Island, thousands of students will have a better learning experience for generations to come." The Government of B.C. is providing \$10.4 million for a new, 95-seat Hornby Island Community School, replacing the previous building that was lost in a fire in August 2018. In addition, construction is set to begin on the \$27.2-million seismic upgrade of Lake Trail Middle school, which will replace everything but the school's gymnasium with a modern facility. "People in our community showed how resilient they can be when the former Hornby Island Community school burned down," said Scott Fraser, MLA for Mid Island-Pacific Rim. "Our government took immediate action to provide short-term classrooms for Hornby students after the fire, and the new school will give them the long-term learning environment they deserve." In addition to a seismically safe school, the investment in Lake Trail Middle school also includes a \$1.5-million child care centre, which will benefit local families. "Today's groundbreaking ceremony is one more positive step toward revitalizing and modernizing a unique school community here in west Courtenay," said Ian Hargreaves, board chair, Comox Valley Schools. "This project will create a safe school for staff and students; moreover, it will allow for significant improvements in the learning environment."



# **CV Community Foundation The Robert L. Ash Endowment Fund**

The Comox Valley Community Foundation recently presented the first distribution from the Robert L. Ash **Endowment Fund to Comox Valley** Schools for \$25,777 was established in 2017 by Beryl St. Albyn Hargood-Ash in honour of her nephew, with the income from the fund to be given annually to a charity or organization of his choice. Mr. Ash, a long-time supporter of secondary school athletics and a former high school wrestling coach, chose Comox Valley Schools as the beneficiary. The annual income will be used to fund secondary school sports team travel, specifically to provincial championships or in support of interprovincial/international exchanges, to assist individual athletes requiring financial assistance, and to fund travel expenses related to other extracurricular programs.



Seven Nala'atsi Indigenous students participated in a day-long journalism academy hosted in Vancouver by CBC November 13. The event involved audio, video and storytelling workshops, to encourage youth to consider broadcast journalism as a possible career prospect. Veteran Indigenous journalists including Duncan McCue, Ian Hanomansing, Angela Sterritt, and Gloria Macarenko led students through workshops. This is a first-time experience for the students who were among 150 Indigenous youth across Canada to participate.

#### TRUSTEE REPORT

I was fortunate to attend the Annual FNESC Indigenous Education Conference in Vancouver from November 28-30, 2019 along with Trustees Kathleen Hawksby, Sarah Jane Howe, and a team of our stellar Indigenous education teachers, education assistants, administrators, and Indigenous Education Council (IEC) representatives. Celebrating its 25th year of working to share information and inspire action on fundamental issues for Indigenous education, the theme this year was *Meeting Diverse Student Needs*. Keynote speakers and workshops provided information about programs and best practices that contribute to improving how we incorporate First Nations language, culture, and ways of learning throughout our district and create inclusive and responsive learning environments. The impacts of trauma on our learners and the needs of children and youth in care, currently or formerly, were highlighted. I know my colleagues would agree that the conference material was transformational, both heart-breaking and inspiring.

The opening session included remarks from Tyrone McNeil, the very able President of FNESC, Lydia Hwitsum of the First Nations Summit Leadership Council, and Minister Rob Fleming. Keynote speaker, Mary Ellen Turpel-Lafond, former BC Representative for Children and Youth and now legal advisor, UBC professor, and director of the UBC Residential School History and Dialogue Centre, shared reflections on her personal journey and the barriers for Indigenous learners carrying the burdens of colonial abuses such as the residential schools and child welfare systems. We were all touched deeply by the special guest, Chief Doctor Robert Joseph from Reconciliation Canada. A survivor of St Michaels residential School in Alert Bay, Chief Joseph's path from a frightened, hurt child to a formidable leader committed to reconciliation, he embodies the power of courage and healing. On Saturday, the panel shared the experiences of being children in care, endeavouring to negotiate unfriendly school environments, "aging out" and transitioning to find their paths through post-secondary education and work. It struck me that these young people spoke of persevering despite being told they couldn't succeed, from

anger and stubbornness rather than encouragement and support. I hope that our work is changing this dynamic for all our students.

Choosing just 4 workshops from the list was stressful. As a trustee, I focused on some of the informational sessions about Ministry of Education programs and systemic issues. Indigenous education, equity, responsibility, and reconciliation was an overview of priorities and policies that must guide our work in the district in addition to the implications of Bill 41, embedding United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) principles in BC law, the Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, the Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Women and Girls, and the BC Tripartite Education Agreement. Key principles can be summed up as: Every Student Can Achieve; Healthy and Effective Learning Environments; and High Standards. These refer in part to evidence of the "racism of low expectations" whereby our Indigenous school funding and programs have been damaged by the stereotypes that Indigenous students do not need full opportunities, won't really succeed anyway, and can get by with "good enough". Having experienced those attitudes towards girls in my day (and sadly still too common), checking our programs and budgets for this bias is crucial. The workshop also highlighted many areas of intersectionality where Indigenous students, those with diverse abilities and learning needs and those in care, call on us for immediate effective responses. The Ministry program Equity in Action has been adopted in 31 districts and I hope we will pursue the possibility of opting into the program this year. I am certainly convinced that the approach of making systemic change through data-driven actions, support and leadership to counteract "deficit narratives" is promising for improving the achievement of all learners. On a less policy wonk level, I attended a terrific presentation from a team at Xetolacw School in Mt. Currie called "Preparing our Home". The program offered as a "super-course" (an intensive elective offering their students a range of experiences) was designed to mobilize youth as leaders in emergency response in their own community. Many First Nation communities occupy what can only be described as "sacrifice- zones", prone to natural hazards, at the end of single in and out roads, and far from organized response systems. In recent years, remote communities have been left to deal with floods, fires, avalanches, rock-slides, road closures, etc. and feel they are often the last thought of or evacuated. This program combined risk assessment, planning and team building with practical skills in sandbagging, organizing food and water, notification (door knocking) protocols, preparing school and home exit plans, emergency bins, grab and go supplies, and pet planning. First Aid training and other certifications and introduction to fire and ambulance procedures may inspire some students to follow career training and all gained in confidence and pride at doing something real to improve their community. I was incredibly

inspired by the idea of mobilizing youth in this area. We know that students learn best when their studies are hands-on and meaningful. School District No. 71 has an excellent emergency preparedness program that focuses on core supplies, staff training, and support. I am hoping we can work with community partners to engage with youth in responsibility and delivery so they can shine in their communities and throughout our district.

I also attended workshops on trauma-informed practice in the classroom talking about racism, with Eric Wong, FNESC Health Education Coordinator. He shared his work since the first antiracism toolkit developed by FNESC nearly 20 years ago changes over that time and how we can effectively teach and practice anti-racism behaviours today. I will share the presentation slides and found it a useful framework for working together on the ReconciliAction goals we have. I know our educational colleagues will be putting their learning experiences into practice in our classrooms and will share with us all to enhance School District No. 71's effectiveness in meeting the needs of every student. We can be so proud of our graduation rates for Indigenous students and all students; we cannot rest too comfortably; we must address the challenges in supporting the outstanding 14%. Many factors are outside of a school district's mandate, but we know that through partnerships and innovation, together, we can do the work that every student deserves.

I am sure Trustees Hawksby and Howe join me in expressing gratitude for the opportunity to attend the conference and share with you.
