#### SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

#### **Kindergarten Registration**

In response to the restrictions imposed by COVID, the annual Kindergarten Orientation Session will change from in-person to a digital event. Allan Douglas, Director of Instruction K-12, teamed up with Jacquie Anderson, Early Learning Lead Teacher, and District program of choice school administrators to create an information video detailing each of the kindergarten offerings. A virtual public Q&A session took place January 27th for families needing additional information or clarification. Kindergarten registration will be entirely online this year and begins February 1st.

#### Pro - D Day Event February 12th

#### **International Student Program**

The District is operating at approx. 56% program capacity. We will host 65 new international students for the second semester. All measures are in place for students & host families following stringent guidelines by the Federal Government, Provincial Health Officer, North Island Chief Medical Officer, and our Health and Safety protocols for schools. Our District is one of 31 in BC to operate an ISP this year.

#### **Foundation Skills Assessment**

#### Background

- The FSA was introduced in BC in 2000 to test students in grades 4, 7 and 10 in the areas of reading, writing and numeracy. Grade 10 portion dropped and replaced with a grade 10 provincial exams in 2004.
- The FSA is a provincial assessment to evaluate student performance at these grade levels.
   The information was presented as a "big picture" provincial snapshot.
- The Fraser Institute uses the data to rank schools and this is the source of frustration as teachers, students and schools become part of this ranking.
- In 2016/17, Alan Douglas, Dir. of Instruction, chaired the Advisory Committee on Provincial Assessment (ACPA) committee for the MOE tasked to find a way forward for the FSA.
- The recommendation was to not allow government to share the data so the ranking of schools would stop. Government responded by stating it is public and open source information.

#### Analysis

- Duration to complete is approximately 3.5 hours for the 3-part assessment using a combination of multiple choice and openended questions.
- The administration starts with a discussion before the assessment and a reflection after assessment completion.
- FSAs are based on the BC curriculum, written by BC educators, administered by BC educators and marked by BC educators.
- Results help determine how students are performing in each area of assessment.
- Assessment administration runs from: February 15th to March 12th, 2021
- Scoring and score entry deadline: April 9th.

## & SCHOOL STORIES

#### SPOTLIGHT: LINK TRANSITION PROGRAM IN ACTION



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Each month one District program will be profiled to showcase our innovative, inquisitive and inclusive approach to education. This month we profile the Link Transition Program (LTP).

LTP is a partnership with North Island College (NIC) and targeted towards students with special needs as they transition from Secondary School to adult services. The program includes focus on community access, work experience and healthy living, and is supported by a teacher, an educational assistance and a work experience program worker.

Through various workshops, site visits and guest speakers, students work on job readiness and employment skills, as well as increasing successful experiences as they investigate diversity within the community.

LTP also helps young adults to identify and familiarize themselves with community agencies such as the Advocacy Centre, transit system, employment services and public health services to increase their confidence and independence.

Since September, students have been involved in shopping, cooking, volunteering with LUSH Food Action Society, and partaking in outdoor recreation including snowshoeing.

## Miracle Beach Young Readers



Miracle Beach launched a reading club in October to encourage students to read 20 chapter books. With help from the teacher-librarian, students chose books that are suitable for their reading level & interests. Ten students have successfully completed their first round. Staff are witnessing an increased level of excitement about reading, and many students have shown improvement in their reading ability in a very short time. To date, there have been over 400 books read – an overwhelming and unanticipated response from students.
