While few of us today can imagine the impacts colonization and residential schools have had on Indigenous Peoples across Canada, most, if not all Indigenous Peoples live with the effects, daily reminders, racism and discrimination that colonization has had and continues to have on us.

It is up to you, as educators, and you as students, and actually more simply, as human beings capable of empathy, to learn, to teach, to see things from a new perspective that yes, can be uncomfortable, but by doing so we can break down barriers, and move forward together with kindness, understanding and a chance at a better future for the generations to come. Thank you for wearing your orange shirts today. I hope today and every day forward brings awareness to issues Indigenous Peoples face and that Reconciliation truly is the path we follow in the days and years ahead."
