## **Temporary Travel and Fuel Restrictions**

The Province of B.C. has implemented two temporary emergency Orders designed to restrict non-essential travel in some areas and to prioritize fuel for essential vehicles. The school district is implementing the following measures for the duration of the orders:

- temporarily postponing games and sporting events at all levels
- postponing field trips (except for trips that are accessible via public transit or walking)
- postponing some in-person events
- conducting meetings online wherever possible (board and committee)
- re-scheduling school activities that require parents/caregivers to drive
- encouraging carpooling or utilizing public transit
- encouraging active school travel (walk, bike, scooter)
- continuing with in-school practices but encouraging carpooling and shared pick-ups

## **Holiday Travel Reminder**

As we look forward to the upcoming holiday season and many people make plans for family visits and vacations, please familiarize yourself with the federal rules and regulations surrounding cross border travel. As part of the federal requirements, anyone who has travelled out of country and is not fully vaccinated, cannot attend a school setting for 14 days after re-entering Canada.

It is very important you are familiar with the specific rules pertaining to your family or child if you plan on leaving Canada on a holiday. It's important to note that rules differ depending on you or your child's vaccination status.

## **Comox Valley Schools will not require proof of vaccination for staff**

After consulting with health experts and thorough discussions at an in-camera meeting, the Board for Comox Valley Schools will not be mandating COVID-19 vaccines for staff at this time. The decision was made after examining local information, and consultations with the local Medical Health Officer and Vancouver Island Health Authority. Comox Valley Schools continue to operate safely and are low-risk settings.



## Green Success at Lake Trail Middle School

One week of waste has been diverted from the landfill by Lake Trails students because of their new green stations. The school has created special sorting bins to facilitate the diversion.

Compost is being picked up by Earth Warriors Composting, and is supported by Leadership and Life-skills students. The school is making efforts to be as waste free as possible in collaboration with the Comox Valley Regional District.



## Tree planting underway at Mark Isfeld High School

You might notice some new additions to the front of Mark Isfeld High School as efforts are underway to enhance the habitat and surrounding areas of the school. The Isfeld Environmental Club is leading the charge. The club is all about creating positive environmental change within our school and community. Their two biggest campaigns currently are planting trees around the school and implementing a school-wide compost system. They also volunteer almost every weekend with local environmental organizations, primarily Project Watershed, doing activities such as pulling invasive plants, transplanting trees and cleaning up trash.
