Superintendent Morrow provides Strategic Planning update

Dr. Jeremy Morrow provided an update regarding the strategic planning process now currently underway. We've completed four public in-person community engagement sessions. The constructive dialogue and the ideas and issues raised will be helpful as we move forward with four writing sessions that will result in the new strategic plan for Comox Valley Schools. Next, we are bringing together more than 30 participants – including elders, vice-principals and principals, teachers, educational assistants, support staff, parents, students, and trustees - for the district writing team. This team is responsible for creating a new Strategic Plan to guide our work over the next few years. A writing team will be meeting over four days in late April and early May to review all the input gathered as well as other sources of evidence and data about how students are doing.

The team's task will be to synthesize the information and data compiled to date into the learning focus for Comox Valley schools over the next few vears.

The Board of Education acknowledges that we are on the traditional territories of the K'ómoks First Nation. We would like to thank them for the privilege of living on their land and the gift of working with their children.



Gender-Based Violence Working Committee Terms of Reference passed by board in unanimous vote


The board voted to accept the Terms of Reference for a Gender Based Violence Working Committee and they also appointed Trustee Shannon Aldinger as the Chair of this committee. The board had passed a motion in June 2023 to establish this committee. The committee will review district policies, administrative procedures and other practices that relate to gender based violence, to identify gaps in our district's approach and response to gender based violence, to identify and develop resources and best practices, to consult with community-based subject-matter experts, and to make recommendations to the superintendent and board. Codes of Conduct to be updated to reflect digital devise restrictions

The Ministry of Education and Child Care has amended the Provincial Standards for Codes of Conduct Order to promote provincial consistency and to support boards of education in ensuring their schools have appropriate policies in place to restrict student personal digital device use. All boards of education are to include one or more statements restricting student use of personal digital devices at school. SD 71 is now aligning our Code of Conduct and other policies pertaining to digital devices to reflect the new provincial rules. All school Codes of Conduct will be updated and an implementation plan was rolled our by Associate Superintendent, Jay Dixon. Once schools have drafted updated Codes of Conduct, they will be seeking feedback from each school community. Information about the new codes of conduct will be shared over summer in the lead up to the start of the 2024-2025 school year. The impact of the new digital device rules will be monitored and adjustments will be made as needed, based on feedback and evaluations, once the new school year is underway.

I am pleased to present our report for April, another month marked by significant contributions and engagement within our school district. Our journey towards a brighter future for Comox Valley Schools continues and this month we held four Strategic Plan public consultation sessions. We look forward to hearing insights into how to best serve our students' needs.
