Food Advisory Committee Update

Thea Cockerton, Comox Valley Schools Food Services Coordinator, delivered a presentation highlighting the district's recent initiatives in enhancing student nutrition and promoting food security. Appointed in August 2024, Ms. Cockerton has been instrumental in implementing the "Feeding Futures" program, which focuses on integrating locally sourced foods into school meal plans, educating students on healthy eating habits, and establishing sustainable food practices within the schools. Her efforts have led to the development of school gardens, partnerships with local farmers, and nutrition workshops, all aimed at fostering a healthier and more informed student body. The Board commended Ms. Cockerton's dedication and the positive impact of her work on the school community.




Board gives the Comox Valley Regional District approval to move forward with arena business case


Trustees approved Option 1 regarding the Business Case for a potential third arena located on school district property next to GP Vanier. This decision allows the Comox Valley Regional District (CVRD) to move forward with a comprehensive business case study to examine the project's scope, costs, and potential funding strategies. The findings of the business case will help determine possible next steps in addressing the region's growing need for additional ice and sports facilities. The board will now await the findings from the business case.



Lisa Pedersen-Skene, District Principal of Early Learning and Child Care, provided additional insights into the upcoming Primary Learning Community (PLC) program at Airport Elementary School. Comox Valley Schools is launching a new K-3 Primary Learning Community program at Airport Elementary School, starting in the 2025-2026 school year. This innovative program blends school, place, and home-based learning to provide a holistic, flexible educational experience for young students from across the district. It emphasizes play-based and place-based learning, fostering creativity, critical thinking, and engagement with the local environment through outdoor and hands-on activities. Key features include multi-age learning cohorts, where students remain with the same teacher and peers over several years, creating a nurturing environment for social, emotional, and cognitive growth. The blended schedule incorporates home-based learning on Mondays, indoor and outdoor activities at Airport Elementary from Tuesday to Thursday, and off-site learning across the Comox Valley on Fridays. Flexible Learning Environments and the Paperless Classroom at Mark R. Isfeld Secondary

The presentation by Brian Mcaskill, Principal, Kim Murcheson, Teacher (Calculus 12, Pre-Calculus 11 & 12, Economics 12, Accounting 11 & 12), and Jay Dixon, Associate Superintendent highlighted Mark R. Isfeld Secondary's integration of technology to enhance education. The school has adopted flexible learning environments that use digital tools to support diverse learning styles, fostering collaboration and critical thinking. Paperless classrooms reduce reliance on paper through digital platforms, improving sustainability and accessibility. Various technology tools are embedded across subjects to enhance engagement and personalized learning, while ongoing professional development ensures educators effectively integrate these tools into their teaching. A student-centered approach empowers learners through interactive and adaptive platforms. The presentation also addresses challenges, such as ensuring equitable access to technology and maintaining engagement, and discusses strategies to overcome these obstacles. Overall, Isfeld is committed to a dynamic, tech-enhanced learning environment that prepares students for the digital age.

Accessibility Committee Progress Update

The presentation by Tara Ryan, District Vice-Principal, Inclusive Education and Sean Lamoureux, Associate Superintendent provided an overview of Comox Valley Schools Accessibility Committee and its initiatives to enhance inclusivity. The committee works to identify and remove barriers for students, staff, and the community. Its key focus areas include ensuring accessible employment practices, improving service delivery, enhancing the built environment with features like ramps and better acoustics, expanding accessible communication and technology, addressing transportation challenges, and promoting mental health and diversity education. The committee actively gathers feedback through various channels and has conducted accessibility audits in multiple schools to assess and improve conditions. The committee comprises a diverse membership, including individuals with diverse abilities and Indigenous representation, allowing for multiple perspectives to inform decision-making.




Lake Trail Grade 7 Students Embrace Entrepreneurship with Their Own Dragon's Den

Recently, the committee hosted a "think tank" session, bringing together students from across the district who have lived experiences of disabilities. To maximize accessibility, a sign-language interpreter and a sound field system were provided, ensuring that everyone could fully participate in the discussions. During the session, students shared their personal experiences and insights on accessibility, inclusion, and belonging. They discussed the environments, supports, and tools that have helped them succeed in school, as well as the barriers they have encountered academically, socially, physically, and emotionally. In a subsequent session, a diverse group, including members of the accessibility committee, the accessibility audit team, and representatives from Indigenous Education and parents, engaged in guided discussions about the tools. environments, and supports needed to improve

To visually capture the essence of these discussions, SPARC BC provided an artist, Melissa Kendzierski from Drawing Change, who created a graphic representation of the conversations. These artistic pieces are currently on display in the Board Room at Inclusive Ed, and we invite community members to view them in person.
