


BOARD MEETING IN REVIEW How Are We Doing Report for 2023-2024

At the February 25, 2025, Comox Valley Schools Board Meeting, Associate Superintendent Joe Heslip presented some local and provincial data from the "How Are We Doing" Report on Indigenous students in B.C and our schools for the 2023-24 school year. The presentation revealed many positive improvements but showed there is still work needed to close some systemic gaps. The Board engaged in discussions on how to effectively utilize the data to narrow achievement differences. The report underscored the need for collective responsibility to further improve upon some of the progress that's being made in recent years.

Safe Schools presentation shines light on web of safety work in schools

Associate Superintendent and Safe Schools Coordinator Jay Dixon delivered a comprehensive update on school safety initiatives. The presentation outlined the various supports, training programs, practices, and procedures implemented to ensure student and staff safety across the district. Emphasizing a collective approach to safety, Dixon shared an overview of the Safe School framework, highlighting the multiple layers of safety measures in place. The district collaborates with Safer Schools Together, a Ministry-contracted organization that monitors online behaviors and provides reports to schools, assisting with local investigations when necessary. Training programs, including the Joint Occupational Health and Safety Committee (JOHSC) and Prismatic, focus on developing preventative safety measures. An ERASE video was shown, outlining reporting mechanisms, training opportunities, and available support resources for students and parents. The Board discussed challenges in disseminating safety information, particularly about digital communication trends, such as interpreting emojis. An update on the District Emergency Response will be provided next month.





Amended Budget for 2024-2025 Approved

The Amended Budget for the 2024-2025 fiscal year was presented by Assistant Secretary-Treasurer Jennifer Nelson and Director of Finance Candice Hilton. Adjustments to the budget followed the finalization of enrollment numbers in September 2024. Notably, 96% of operating revenue is funded through the Ministry grant, with an increase in operating funds this school year attributed to growth in online and inclusive education enrollment. Expense adjustments were made to support new learners, and two new positions—Manager of Human Resources and 0.6 VP for Indigenous Education—were added to support district needs. Additionally, one-time surplus funds were utilized to fund two term positions: a District Principal of Equity, Diversity, and Non-discrimination and an Indigenous Knowledge Specialist. The district remains focused on living within its means while addressing inflationary and operational pressures. Following a thorough review and discussion, the Board approved the Amended Annual Budget Bylaw for fiscal year 2024-2025, with a total budget bylaw amount of \$163,483,016.
